First Announcement & Call for Papers XIV International TICCIH Congress Freiberg/Germany 2009

With this first announcement and call for papers we would like to invite you to participate in the XIV International Congress of The International Committee for the Conservation of the Industrial Heritage (TICCIH), which will be held in Germany from 30th of August to 5th of September 2009.

The congress will be held at the Technical University and Mining Academy of Freiberg in the historic city centre of the old silver mining town of Freiberg (founded 1168) in Saxony/Germany. The city of Freiberg and its surrounding landscape of the Erzaebirge (Ore Mountains) at the southeast border of Germany to the Czech Republic are shaped by mining activities over more than eight hundred years. Hundreds of technical and industrial monuments in Freiberg and in the Erzgebirge from the middle age times of silver mining to the large scale uranium mining of the twentieth century are forming an unique industrial landscape with shafts, engine houses, foundries, pits and dumps, large scale water power systems, mining settlements and mining towns. Hundreds of years of mining also influenced the whole culture (architecture, arts, handicraft, music, literature and customs) of the region, which is going to be nominated as a UNESCO World Heritage mining landscape in the near future.

Moreover the river valleys of the Erzgebirge are one of the birthplaces of the German textile industry in the early nineteenth century. Based on mining and textile industry the

nearby industrial city of Chemnitz became the heart of the German engine building and machine-tool industry during the nineteenth century. Important industrial monuments, a large number of technical and industrial museums as well as a cultural landscape formed by mining and industrial activities are still representing the great industrial history of this area.

The congress will give all participants the opportunity to visit this unique industrial landscape. Two congress excursions as well as one of the five offered pre- and post congress tours will lead us to the Industrial Museum and industrial monuments of Chemnitz, to the great redevelopment project of the International Building Exhibition IBA-SEE in the former brown coal-area of northeast Saxony and in a four day post congress tour to other exceptional industrial monuments in Saxony. Pre-congress tours to the industrial monuments of the West German Ruhr-Region and to the German capital of Berlin as well as two further post-congress tours across the Saxon border to Poland (Industrial Landscape of Silesia) and to the Czech Republic (Industrial Landscape of Ostrava) will give further the opportunities to visit important industrial heritage regions in the heart of Europe.

In addition to the congress excursions and the scientific congress programme several social events will be offered: A welcome-party in the just renovated Renaissance-Castle of Freiberg, a symphony concert in the concert hall of St. Nicolai Church in Freiberg, an organ concert with the famous Silbermann-Organ in the Freiberg Cathedral, a visit in the Saxon Treasury "Grünes Gewölbe" in the nearby Saxon capital Dresden and a farewell-party and Elbe river trip on one of the old steamboats of the Saxon Steamboat Company.

Together with the scientific part of the congress we hope to offer all of you an attractive programme and with this a good reason to join the XIV International TICCIH Congress 2009 in Freiberg/Germany. On behalf of the TICCIH 2009 Organizing Committee we are looking forward to welcome you in Germany.

Scientific Programme

Since the beginning of industrialisation the development of more and more new industries has changed the urban and rural landscapes all over the world. The process of birth, growth and decline of such industries is still visible not only in the remaining industrial monuments, it is also alive in the structure of an artificial landscape which was formed over centuries by industrial activities and the development of technical infrastructure. The increasing influence of industrialisation on the economical and social development of society was observed early and it was clearly analysed before the middle of the nineteenth century. At the end of the nineteenth and the beginning of the twentieth century its positive connotation became one of the reasons for the "discovery" and "construction" of industrial monuments and the development of industrial heritage programmes.

The massive industrial impact on landscape and especially on environment was discovered much later – not earlier than in the last decades of the twentieth century, when the oil-crisis, the catastrophe of Tschernobyl, the massive pollution of the air and the sea and the publications of the Club of Rome opened up a worldwide view of the ecological influences of global industrialisation. This new view of industrialisation caused again a reaction in the view of industrial monuments and industrial heritage. To quote Sir Neil Cossins not only for the case of Britain:

"Such was the impact of these seismic shifts in the social geography of Britain that by the 1990s regeneration of those urban landscapes that had suffered progressive decay as they were denuded of people and industries had become a national priority. So called 'brown field' areas, mostly in and around the old industrial heartlands ..., were to be the places where people would live and work in the future, taking pressure off the countryside and reviving the fortunes of urban life. A key part of this new approach to planning and investment is 'regeneration through heritage', the recognition that many of the buildings on which urban and industrial living had been built a century and more ago themselves afforded opportunities not for simple re-use but as keys to reviving and maintaining the social fabric of communities." (Twentieth Century Industrial Archaeology, London 2000, p. vii).

'Regeneration through heritage' in the sense of Neil Cossins is needed not only for urban industrial landscapes but also for many rural industrial landscapes like former mining or textile regions all over the world. But under the economic pressure of globalisation and with spare public finances the most common solution for this problem were and still are programmes for changing 'brown fields' into 'green fields'. In most cases this means nothing else than 'cleaning up the side' by demolishing all buildings and infrastructure for a redevelopment as cheap as possible. This is especially a growing problem in urban and rural regions where the decline of industry, the drop of population and the lag of public money is causing problems in finding proper solutions for a re-use or even for a simple preservation of industrial monuments.

A further problem in this context is the question of contamination of industrial monuments or historical industrial landscapes with toxic remains of the former industrial production and the technical and economical ways to deal with this problem. Especially in the case of historical industrial landscapes the search for the keys of reviving and maintaining the ecological and social fabric of the landscape is a difficult task between environmental, economical and heritage questions and problems with no simple solutions.

The congress theme 'Industrial Heritage, Ecology and Economy' is aiming at these close connections between environmental, economical, technical, social and historical questions of industrial heritage in our modern world. It should be a forum of presentation and discussion of these problems and of realized, actual and planned projects and concepts for the solution of this problems. Therefore it will not only focus on the traditional participants of the TICCIH conferences. The congress, its planned sessions and workshops should be open for participants from all scientific and administrative fields and institutions which are dealing with ecological, economical and heritage problems of industrial monuments and industrial landscapes.

Questions and dimensions of the main congress topic

The Programme Committee of the congress invites all interested colleagues to offer papers, posters or special sessions and workshops for the TICCIH congress 2009 especially for the following questions and dimensions of the main congress topic "Industrial Heritage, Ecology and Economy":

- Industrial monuments and the cleaning up of old industrial sites
- Industrial Heritage, environmental protection and the preservation of nature
- Heritage concepts for the cleaning up and the re-use of industrial areas and industrial landscapes
- Economical concepts for the preservation and re-use of industrial monuments, industrial areas and industrial landscapes
- Regeneration through heritage: Reviving and maintaining the social fabric of urban and rural communities
- Industrial monuments and relicts of industrial culture as elements of cultural landscapes

More and other issues closely connected to the main congress topic may be offered. They are welcome.

Other congress topics

As usual the International TICCIH Congress 2009 is open for any other industrial heritage topic presented in a paper, poster, session or workshop beside the main congress topic. The congress should be a forum for the presentation of new research results as well as the discussion of new methods in research, documentation, preservation, conservation and re-use in industrial heritage. The Programme Committee of the congress welcomes more general sessions for the following themes:

- New methods of recording and documentation of industrial sites and landscapes
- Industrial heritage and regional identity
- Industrial heritage and tourism
- Cross-boarder-concepts for industrial heritage
- Industrial landscapes as part of the UNESCO World Heritage
- Teaching industrial archaeology

General organization of the scientific programme

Congress language will be English. All papers have to be presented in English. There will be no translation service.

The congress will be organized in three different types of presentations: Sessions, workshops and poster-sessions. The decision about the admission of a session or workshop and a free paper or poster will be made at the end of the year 2008 by the Programme Committee of the congress. **Deadline for the application of a session, workshop, paper or poster will be 30th November 2008.** Information about the accepted sessions, workshops, papers and posters will be sent out in February 2009.

There will be a minimum of 55 and a maximum of 77 sessions/work-shops with together 175 to 245 papers in 5 to 7 parallel meetings of one and a half or two hours. Two poster-sessions will be held.

Sessions

A *Plenary Session* with invited speakers will open the conference. The papers of this session will give an introduction and overview to the general topics of the main theme of the congress.

The congress will offer internally and externally planned sessions as well as free paper sessions. Internally planned session will be organized by the Programme Committee and by the TICCIH Special Sections. Externally planned sessions focussed on a special topic can organized by a single person or a group of persons. Free paper sessions will be organized by the Programme Committee according to the topics of the offered papers. Sessions can be submitted for the main congress topic (Type A) or for other free topics of the congress (Type B).

Depending on the timetable of the congress with regular time-slots of one and a half hour (Type Ta) sessions or workshops should include 3 papers, each of 30 minutes (including 10 minutes discussion time).

For a limited number of afternoon time-slots there will be the possibility of sessions with 4 papers (Type Tb = two hour session).

There will be the opportunity to organize sessions with two time-slots including a maximum number of 6 or 7 papers.

Workshops

A workshop is a more discussion orientated form of session. It can be organized with only one or two introduction papers or with short statements for opening up a discussion. It also could be used to discuss a prepared declaration or paper or to have a free discussion about a special topic. Discussion time should be by minimum one hour.

Workshops can be organized by the Programme Committee or TICCIH special sections (internal) as well as by single persons or groups of persons (external). They can be submitted for the main congress topic (Type A) or for other free topics of the congress (Type B). The regular time-slot of a workshop is one and a half hour (Type Ta). In special cases there will be the opportunity to get a time-slot of two hours (Type Tb).

Papers

Papers are generally limited to 20 minutes. Each paper will have an additional discussion time of 10 minutes.

Papers can be offered within an internally or externally organized session or workshop or as free papers. Depending on the topic free papers will be arranged by the Programme Committee of the congress to special free paper sessions or included into internally organized sessions if this is possible. Papers can be submitted to the main congress topic (Type A) or to other free topics of the congress (Type B).

Papers for internally and externally organized sessions or workshops have to be organized and selected by the organizers of these sessions and workshops. They are part of the application for these sessions and workshops.

Posters and poster-sessions

For new research results, industrial heritage projects as well as industrial archaeology or industrial heritage institutions and organizations, teaching courses or companies active in this field there will be the opportunity to present themselves with posters in two special poster-sessions.

The Poster-sessions during the congress will be organized in one and a half hour time-slots at central places of the congress. During the time of these sessions the participants of the congress will have the opportunity to discuss the posters with their authors.

Timetable of the congress

The congress will be held from 30th August to 5th September 2009 at the congress and lecture rooms of the Technical University and Mining Academy of Freiberg in the historic city centre of Freiberg. All conference facilities are within a walking distance of five minutes.

Further Information

Social events

During the congress several social events will take place: Welcome Party in the renaissance castle of Freiberg, Symphony concert in the concert hall St. Nicolai in Freiberg, Organ concert in the cathedral of Freiberg, Reception at the Industrial Museum of Chemnitz, Reception at the IBA Fürst-Pückler-Land and a visit in the Saxon Treasury "Grünes Gewölbe" in Dresden. All these events are included in the congress fee.

The congress will end on Saturday evening (5th September) with a riverboat trip on a historic steam-boat at the Elbe River in Dresden. Because of the limited places on the steam-boat a special reservation and fee for this event will be necessary. Details will be given in the Second announcement for the congress in October 2008.

Costs of the congress

The congress-fee will be 300 Euro for each regular participant and 100 Euros for students/phd-students. This fee includes:

- Coffee breaks
- Welcome party in Freiberg
- Symphony concert in Freiberg

Not included in the congress fee are the costs for the guided pre- and post-congress tours and the steam-boat trip on the Elbe River. The costs of each congress tour will be around 100 to 120 Euros a day. The costs of the steam-boat trip incl. farewell dinner will be around 30 Euros. Detailed information will be given in the Second Announcement for the congress in October 2008.

Deadline for the final registration of participants will be 30th May 2009. Registration and payment after this deadline will be possible with a special late registration fee (400 Euros for regular participants, 150 Euros for students). A final registration form will be included in the Second announcement for the congress in October 2008.

Supporting programmes for students and participants with low income

For students there will be a special supporting programme which will cover the congress-fee and the accommodation in a special guest house (two-bed rooms with shower) in Freiberg. This programme gives 26 students the opportunity to reduce the costs of their participation in the congress. The application for this programme is possible with a letter of recommendation by a professor of the student's university. Further information will be given in the Second Announcement for the congress in October 2008.

Participants with low income and no financial support by their home countries or institutions can apply for a travel grant given by the Organizing Committee of the congress. The number and amount of these grants depend on the concession of German research promotion agencies (DFG, DAAD and others) which will be asked to support the congress. Further information will be given in the Second Announcement for the congress in October 2008.

Accommodation costs in Freiberg

Freiberg is a small university town (around 43.000 inhabitants) with an accommodation capacity in hotels and guest houses of around 680 beds. The prices for a double room incl. breakfast are moderate (between 25 to 90 Euros per night). A list of hotels with special congress rates will be given in the Second Announcement for the congress in October 2008 Further information of the Tourist Information Office of Freiberg can be found under www. freiberg.de.

Guidelines for submitting abstracts

- 1. All sessions, workshops, posters and papers accepted by the Programme Committee will be presented during the congress.
- Sessions, workshops, posters and papers can be the result of individual or collective research and/or the presentation of specific experiences that raise awareness of industrial archaeology or industrial heritage (incl. projects, restoration, re-use, transformation, management etc.).
- 3. Papers presented in sessions must be no longer than 20 minutes. Each paper will have an additional discussion time of 10 minutes.
- 4. Sessions must have 3 or 4 papers depending on the time-slot (Ta = one and a half hour; Tb = two hours).
- 5. Workshops can be a combination of an introduction paper and/or short statements (each of 5 minutes) together with a longer discussion time (minimum 60 minutes).
- 6. Posters must be presented in the size of DIN A 1 (594 x 841 mm). For each application only one poster is possible. Proposals for posters should be no longer than 200 words.
- 7. Proposals (abstracts) for sessions, workshops and papers should be no longer than 500 words and must be submitted in English. They can include drawings, photographs and references.
- 8. Proposals for sessions and workshops must include the name(s) of the organizers as well as the names of the speakers/authors and the titles of their papers or statements together with the abstracts of the papers which in this case should not be longer than 200 words for each paper. It is to be indicated that the session/workshop is part of the main congress topic (Type A) or of the free topic part (Type B) of the congress.
- 9. Proposals (abstracts) must be submitted in a Word document, format 12 Arial. The title must be in capital letters and should be followed by the name(s) of the author(s) and current institution(s).
- 10. Session and workshop organizers must state the type of time-slot (Ta/Tb) they prefer and the number of time-slots (maximum two) they will need.
- 11. Proposals must be sent until 30th November 2008 to


